

DAYLESFORD HERALD MAY 31ST, 1907

The funeral of the late Mr. Henry Thompson, which took place on Wednesday, the scene of internment being the Franklinford cemetery, was very largely attended, there being about forty conveyances, a number on foot, and a number of horsemen. At the deceased's residence, Shepherds Flat, the coffin was brought out into the open, and a short service was conducted by the Rev. J. McBride (Methodist) who also held the service at the grave. The employees of the Adelaide mine attended in a body, and formed in lines from the house to the hearse, the remains being borne between them, and like order was observed between hearse and grave. The bearers were Messrs. John, James, David and George Henderson, H.L. Duff and Peter Tomasini. The cord-bearers were Messrs. John and Joseph Hedley (Brothers-in-law) E. Robinson and W. Robinson (brothers of Mr. Robinson the other mine victim) J. Harvey (director of the Adelaide company) and J. Daniel (Manager of the mine). The miners association was represented at the funeral by the same officers as at Tuesday's funeral, and miners attended from every claim. The burial arrangements were carried out by Mr. Verey.

NOTE: The bearers Messrs. John, James, David and George Henderson were the brothers-in-law of Charles Thompson, Henry's brother.
